

Some children in our congregation are going to be sharing during the week of Vacation Bible School through the Mission Possible. Perhaps you might be interested in helping them by adding to what they will be doing by making a donation from their wishlist.
- 2. In the book Extra Yarn, a young girl changes her town by sharing what she has. Watch a read-aloud of the story here. What can you learn from this story? Can you find a book about sharing? There are so many! Some of my favorites are are *Stone Soup*, *The Rainbow Fish*, and *LLlama Llama Time to Share*.
- 3. Journal, considering the following:
 - a. Why did large crowds follow Jesus? What were they looking for?
 - b. How do you think Jesus got enough food for everyone from the little boy's lunch bag?
 - c. What similarities do you notice between this story and Communion?
 - d. What does the word "abundance" mean to you?

READING FROM THE GOSPELS

John 6: 1-15

After this Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. Now the Passover, the festival of the Jews, was near. When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming toward him, Jesus said to Philip, "Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, "Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, "There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?" Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted. When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost." So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets. When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world."

When Jesus realized that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain by himself.

*THE AFFIRMATION OF FAITH (unison)

A Declaration of Faith, Chapter 4.49-72

Jesus was God in the flesh. Jesus Christ overthrew evil powers that enslaved and degraded people, yet he made no use of power to protect himself. He healed those who were sick in body and mind, yet he did not avoid pain and suffering for himself. He commanded his followers to place loyalty to him above loyalty to family and country, yet he lived among them as a servant Jesus taught with authority, challenging many time-honored customs and ideas, yet he submitted to humiliation and death without a word on his own behalf. He forgave sinners, yet he was counted among sinners. We recognize the work of God in Jesus' power and authority. He did what only God can do. We also recognize the work of God in Jesus' lowliness. When he lived as a servant and went humbly to his death the greatness that belongs only to God was manifest. In both his majesty and lowliness Jesus is the eternal Son of God, God himself with us.




