- 1. Journal Questions

 - b. What does the word "resurrection" mean to you?
 - c. We don't see Jesus in the same way that Mary saw Jesus. In what ways do we see Jesus? How do you know?

- 3. Make a set of six eggs that will tell the story of Easter. You will need an item for each one. You can find the item around your house of draw, color, and cut one out.  - a. Leaf
 - i. So they took branches of palm trees and went out to meet him, shouting, "Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord—the King of Israel!" John 12:13
 - b. Piece of Bread
 - i. Then he took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me." Luke 22:19
 - c. Some coins
 - i. Then one of the twelve, who was called Judas Iscariot, went to the chief priests and said, "What will you give me if I betray him to you?" They

paid him thirty pieces of silver. And from that moment he began to look for an opportunity to betray him. -Matthew 26:14-16

- d. A tiny piece of paper rolled into a scroll to represent Jesus' prayer
 - i. He came out and went, as was his custom, to the Mount of Olives; and the disciples followed him. When he reached the place, he said to them, "Pray that you may not come into the time of trial." Then he withdrew from them about a stone's throw, knelt down, and prayed, "Father, if you are willing, remove this cup from me; yet, not my will but yours be done." Luke 22:39-41
- e. A small rock
 - i. He then rolled a stone against the door of the tomb. Mark 15:46
- f. Leave this one empty, just like the tomb on Easter morning!
 - i. But the angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid; I know that you are looking for Jesus who was crucified. He is not here; for he has been raised, as he said. Come, see the place where he lay. Then go quickly and tell his disciples, 'He has been raised from the dead, and indeed he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him.' "Why do you seek the living among the dead?" - Luke 24:5

Whether it is your custom to slip on the newest Lily Pulitzer, Vineyard Vines, or simply a new pair of flip-flops when Easter rolls around, you may decide to leave them in the closet for now, and yet, there is no delaying of Easter, for it impossible to restrain the power of God's love even at such a time as this. Jesus is risen and the specter of death shall not change that. Consider this verse from poet Ann Weems. Preparing for Holy Week at Home

General Worship Preparation

Think about creating a sacred setting for worship. Maybe you will light a candle and have a plate and a cup set out. Perhaps you will add some greenery, a cross, a Bible, and/or a small bowl of water to represent the baptismal font. Consider leaving this space for the full week of Holy Week.

Maundy Thursday: 5:00 p.m., Live Streaming

at www.smpchome.org, facebook.com/southmecklenburgpresbyterian, and the Boxcast app on Roku, AppleTV, and AmazonFire. You will want to prepare to have dinner after the worship service livestream. If possible, plan to eat on real plates. If you have cloth napkins, use them. Set a sacred tone for your meal. You will want bread/crackers and juice/wine—whatever you already have in your home. You will also need a large bowl of water and a hand towel for the end of the meal. See instructions for an Agape Meal on the next page.

Good Friday: 7:30 p.m., Streaming

at www.smpchome.org, facebook.com/southmecklenburgpresbyterian, and the Boxcast app on Roku, AppleTV, and AmazonFire. You will want to watch this service in a dark room or a room which you can make dark. A Tenebrae service typically begins with light and lit candles, and as each part of the service is finished, a candle is blown out and the light is dimmed. You can start in a dark room and just observe the candlelight going out eight times as you stream the service, or you can turn off lights yourself to match the service!

Holy Saturday Stations of the Cross: 10:00 a.m.-11:00 a.m., Zoom

Please sign up here to sign up for this experience. It's not necessary, but we will email you some sheets to print if you desire.

Otherwise, you will need: paper, writing utensil, and crayons/markers/colored pencils.

Maundy Thursday Agape Meal Thursday, April 9

Introduction

On Maundy Thursday, Christians around the world remember Jesus' last supper with his disciples. We gather for communion every Maundy Thursday at SMPC to celebrate communion and reflect on Jesus' love for us, remembering that Jesus gave the disciples a new commandment on this evening, "to love one another as I have loved you," (John 13:34). "Agape" is one of the Greek words for "love," and so we invite you to share in a meal of love this evening in your household after participating in our livestreamed worship. This meal is intended to be an extension of worship. It is our hope and prayer that whether you live alone or with others, you will find that this is a meaningful experience for you.

Preparing

There's no need to go to the store for your meal. Make something that you will enjoy and that will not be stressful. Consider using cloth napkins. Set the table. Make a centerpiece (this is a great activity for children if they live in your home). Consider placing a cross, a Bible, and/or a candle on the table. You will need:

bread/crackers and juice/wine—whatever you already have in your home, even if that is saltines and soda! Do not use these until the end of the meal.

A large bowl

A hand towel

Gathering

Open with prayer: Holy God, I (we) thank you for everything you have given us. For a table around which to gather, I (we) thank you. For signs of joy and hope, we thank you. For this meal, I (we) thank you. May this worship experience draw me (us) ever closer to you and be a symbol of hope. Bless this food to the nourishment of my body (our bodies) and me (us) to your service. Amen.

Mealtime Reflection or Conversation

Think about a person who embodies love for you. If you are alone, consider writing to this person to express your gratitude. If you are with others, share about the person and why they embody love to you.

Agape Meal

When you have finished eating, clear the table and move into the agape meal part of your worship. Spend some time in prayer. Offer to God:

Something you are thankful for

A time in recent days when you have experienced God's love

Any fears and concerns you've been holding during these days

People and places you know need God's special touch right now

Our church, our community and our world

Conclude with the Lord's Prayer



Staying Connected

South Mecklenburg Presbyterian Church is employing various avenues of technology to keep us connected and informed.

Our worship staff, careful to maintain social distance, are gathering in our Sanctuary on Sunday mornings to create a worship experience through live streaming. Access to live streaming has been expanded across several communication channels to make it even easier to join in worship.





Our website, <u>www.smpchome.org</u> has been revamped to shift our live and past worship services to the forefront. From the home page of the website, we can join in worship, view the worship bulletin, and participate in online giving. Our website is viewable in both desktop and mobile versions.





We are also taking full advantage of our existing Facebook page (www.facebook.com/southmecklenburgpresbyterian) by live streaming our worship service, sharing announcements and updates, and creating "Noon Prayer", a Facebook Live video leading us in prayer at 12:00 p.m. each Wednesday. Be sure to "like" our page.

If you use the streaming services ROKU, Apple TV, or Amazon Fire TV, you can now view our live and past worship services by adding BOXCAST from your channel store. Search for "South Mecklenburg Presbyterian Church", mark it as favorite, and watch from your television. (See instructions on the previous page.)

To give online:

- 2. Enter the amount you would like to give, and then select a fund from the drop-down menu.

Most gifts will be to the Operating Fund. For Spoon it Up *donations, select "Other" and type* Spoon it Up *in the memo box.*

- 3. Enter your email address and click continue. On the next screen you will be prompted to enter your debit card, credit card, or bank account information.
- 4. Click "Give."

To give via text:

- 1. Text SMPC to 73256.
- 2. Click the link in the reply text you will receive.
- 3. Enter the amount you would like to give and tap the "Text Gifts" box.
- 4. You will be prompted to enter your debit card, credit card, or bank account information.
- 5. Click "Give."

To set up a recurring online gift:

- 1. Log in to ChurchLife and select "Give Online" from the "Giving" drop down menu.
- 2. Enter the amount you would like to give, and then select a fund from the drop-down menu.
- 3. Choose the frequency of your gift amount (weekly, semi-monthly, monthly, quarterly).
- 4. Enter your debit card, credit card, or bank account information and click "Give."
